Lauderdale School Celebrated

On May 19, over 240 people came to help remember and celebrate the Lauderdale School which has been the Chinese Christian Church for the last 40+ years. A fun day with five former teachers and nine scheduled tours throughout the building. Many volunteers, lots of chatting, laughing, and reminiscing! A history/memory book is being written by Kathy Bernstrom Lerfald, former student and current Lauderdale resident.

The City's intention is to sell the property to a developer whose vision for the site matches that of the City Council and the community. The City Council is interested in seeing some form of senior-friendly housing. It will be up to the new buyer whether they can use some or all of the existing structure but that doesn't seem likely based on what the City is hearing from prospective buyers. In the weeks and months ahead, the City

may put items from the building up for sale. If interested, be sure you are on the City's email list.

News from City Hall

- The City took possession of the former Twin Cities Chinese Christian Church at 1795 Eustis Street on May 14. Prospective developers are looking at the site. When a developer seems ready to propose a concept, we will make the community aware.
- In the meantime, the building will find purpose as a public safety training facility. You will see the fire and police departments using the building for a wide variety of trainings. Most of the trainings will occur on Tuesdays and Saturdays.
- Prior to issuing bonds to pay for 1795 Eustis Street, the City was evaluated for a bond rating. The City received a "AA rating with a stable outlook" from Standard & Poors. As a result, the interest rate the City received on the bond sold was very favorable.
- The City Council is in the final stages of negotiating for the jurisdictional transfer of Eustis Street and Roselawn Avenue. If negotiations continue favorably, an agreement could be before the Council in August. If approved, planning will begin in earnest for a 2019 street reconstruction project.
- The City's public works project for 2018 is sanitary sewer lining. Sewer pipes that weren't replaced during the street construction projects between 2000-2003 are almost 20 years older and will be lined to ensure they last another 30 years plus.
- The draft Comprehensive Plan is out for review at www.LauderdalePlan2040.com. Please review and send comments and questions to city staff. Adoption of the Plan is expected later this year.

Ramsey County has added early voting locations where all Ramsey County residents can vote. You do not need to early vote at Lauderdale City Hall. Recreational Fires Rules

Fires are allowed but regulated for health and safety reasons. Approved materials for burning include: dried trees, twigs, small branches, charcoal, and cord wood. Recreational fires refer to a small fire that does not exceed 3' in diameter and 2' in height. It must also be contained in an area of noncombustible, non-smoke, and non-odor producing materials (i.e.: rock, cement, brick) that is at least 6" deep and be 25' from anything combustible. A fire must be tended at all times. Something to extinguish the flame must be present (i.e. garden hose). A recreational fire shall not burn when an air quality or drought warning are issued. Fires are permitted between the hours of 7 a.m. and midnight. For more details please visit the City's website.

Yard Waste

Did you know that leaves, grass clippings, trees, and other types of yard waste are banned from the trash? Composting is the best option! The plant material breaks down into a rich soil.

Residents may bring plant waste to any of Ramsey County's seven yard waste sites. A photo ID is required. All sites accept leaves, grass clippings, garden plants, and other non-woody plants. Text-To-911: Call If You Can; Text If You Can't

Text-to-911 capability now is available throughout the state of Minnesota. Dispatch centers around the state have the ability to receive text messages from cell phones requesting emergency services. The service was first deployed in December 2017. Text-to-911 service can be an option for people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or

have speech impairments. It is also a discreet way to report domestic violence, home invasions, suicidal individuals, or situations where someone must stay quiet to remain safe. While this service offers an alternative to reach emergency services, text-to-911 should only be used when a person can't safely make a voice call. CALL if you can; TEXT if you can't.

The MN Department of Public Safety and Emergency Communication Networks provide the following explanation on how to text 911:

- Enter "911" in the "To" field
- Text your exact location and the type of emergency
- Send the message
- Promptly answer questions and follow instructions from the dispatcher

Some things to keep in mind when using text to contact 911:

- Use simple words. Avoid using emoji pictures, abbreviations, or slang (BRB, BTW, IDK...)
- The dispatcher will ask if they can call you. Dispatchers prefer voice calls because they get cues from background noise and voice inflections
- Location is not as accurate with text as with voice calls. Be certain to give an exact address. Landlines are still the best call option to provide location information

I hope you never need to use 911, but if you do, keep text-to-911 in mind for situations where speaking or making a call might be unsafe. While there are limits, this option makes 911 accessible to more people and a safer option in dangerous and unpredictable situations.

ENVIRONMENTAL STEWARDSHIP

What can I do to protect water quality?

Fertilizer, leaves, grass clippings, animal waste, and eroded soil are all sources of phosphorus. When they are swept or washed into the street or storm drain, they end up in Walsh Lake and the pond in the Nature Area before being carried to the Mississippi River. Do your part!

- Buy phosphorus-free lawn fertilizer
- Apply fertilizer in late summer and never before a storm or on frozen ground
- Keep soil, leaves, and lawn clippings out of the street
- Mow higher. Keeping your grass length to 2 1/2 to 3 inches is healthier for your lawn.
- Pick up pet waste promptly. Pet waste can contain harmful bacteria as well as nutrients that cause excess algae and weed growth in lakes and rivers.



City staff received a number of calls about "sink holes" this spring. In an older community like ours, it is not uncommon to find a void beneath the surface of your lawn. Most often they are the by-product of decayed or collapsed cisterns, wells, or even tree roots (imagine the voids left as the roots of our old elm trees decay). These holes can be hazardous so it is best to take action right away. For cisterns, your options include removing them, filling them in, or sealing them. All wells must be sealed before filling the voids around them. If you are unable to do this work yourself, the best option is to call a contractor with experience to help you decide what to do. Unfortunately, city staff do not have records of cisterns and wells. But as a large percentage of homes in town were built before the City offered municipal water and sewer, the likelihood of finding one on your property is pretty good.

Ramsey County Emergency Notification Service

Ramsey County provided residents with a way to get emergency alerts to their phone. The County Emergency Dispatch Center alerts residents of local emergency situations by landline phone. However, residents also may sign up to receive these notifications by text message, e-mail, or cell phone at one or multiple locations (i.e. home and/or work).



A local emergency is an imminent threat to healthy and safety affecting the locations you added to your profile. Examples include:

- Hazardous chemical spills or explosions
- A lost child or vulnerable adult
- A person attempting to harm others

Sign up at https://member.everbridge.net/index/453003085612286#/login. Once registered, you will receive emergency alerts based on your preferences. For example, you can choose text message first—then email—then cell phone. The alert will be delivered to you in that priority. On mobile phones, the text message will always be delivered from 89361 or 87844. Phone calls will appear from 651-266-9990. Emails will be delivered from an @everbridge.net address.
