


Warm Summer Greetings,

I am using this space to highlight a few of the exciting and important items going on in the City.

The Fern at 1795 Eustis Street will be open this fall. Emails with instructions for completing the leasing paperwork recently went out to those on the waiting list. If you are on the waiting list but did not receive an email, please call Real Estate Equities at 651-419-5617.

The Ramsey County Board recently adopted the county-wide Comprehensive Emergency Operations Plan (CEOP) prepared by Ramsey County Emergency Management staff. Each Ramsey County city has the option to adopt this plan as their own CEOP, which the City Council did recently. A copy of the Plan is available on the City's website under the Fire Department tab.



The City Council will have its annual goal setting session at the July 11 city council meeting. This also starts the 2024 budget discussion. The state legislature restored half of the local government aid we lost in 2023. This budgetary hole was plugged with American Rescue Plan Act funds. This is one of many topics for discussion and we look forward to community input around community priorities for the upcoming year.

Ramsey County continues to move ahead with plans for the reconstruction of Eustis Street south of Larpenteur Avenue. As I write, they are selecting a consulting engineering firm to finish the design work ahead of another community open house this fall. In the meantime, the City Council is modeling the financial pros and cons of the turnback options as we update the City's long-term financial plan. That discussion is slated for September 12. The decision whether to take ownership of this stretch of road has future consequences. We will know better what they are by the next newsletter.

I look forward to seeing you all at Day in the Park on July 13 from 5:00—8:00 p.m. I love our annual summer event. This also is the time to sign up your block for Night to Unite on August 1. A special thanks to our community partners. Their special events, charitable work, and commitment to community and neighbors are highlighted in this newsletter edition.

## Safety for Pedestrians, Bicyclists, and Pets

After a long winter and spring, residents want to enjoy the warm summer weather. Whether going for a walk or riding bikes with friends or our furry animal friends, there are some rules to keep in mind to stay safe.

Walk against traffic (left side of roadway): Facing traffic gives pedestrians the ability to see vehicles as they come toward them. This allows for pedestrians to get out of the way or dodge traffic if needed. The use of a sidewalk, if available, is always recommended.

**Bike with traffic (same as with vehicles):** Bicyclists must obey all traffic laws (Minnesota Statute 169.222, Subdivision 1).

When biking at night: At night, you must have both a front light and a rear red reflector attached to your bike. This helps motorists better detect you in the dark. (Minnesota Statute 169.222, Subdivision 6).



Wear bright colors: Wearing bright colors helps drivers see you. When walking at night, reflective gear or a small flashing light can increase your visibility.

**Put away your cell phone:** Looking at your phone distracts you from your surroundings. You may not notice other vehicles, walkers, or runners that are heading in your direction. If using earbuds, turn off the noise cancelling function so you can hear what is happening around you.

**Using a short leash for animals:** Using a short leash for your furry friend allows you to prevent them from darting into traffic. This also keeps them at a secure distance from other walkers and bikers.

**Reminder for pet owners:** There is a city or dinance against having an animal off leash. This includes public parks. Learn more about our pet ordinances at <u>www.lauderdalemn.org</u>.

## What is an Illicit Discharge?

The US Environmental Protection Agency defines an illicit discharge as, "any discharge into a storm drain system that is not composed entirely of stormwater." This means that anything other than the water that falls from the sky is an illicit discharge. There are many hazardous household products, yard care products, fertilizers, dog waste, car soaps, and automotive fluids that pollute and degrade local water quality.

Municipalities are required to implement programs to "detect and eliminate" illicit discharges. This is important because what goes down the storm sewer drain does not go to a waste water treatment facility. It goes directly into local water bodies where people swim, participate in recreational water activities, and fish. If a gallon of pollutant goes down the storm drain, then a gallon of pollutant washes into the waters that people are using for fun and food.

Please be cautious about what washes off of your property and notify staff at City Hall at 651-792-7650 if you detect any illicit discharge. It is illegal and can directly affect you!



Can I Recycle Small Plastic Items like Straws and Bottle Caps?

Don't put small items like straws, plastic utensils, or loose caps in the recycling. Small items fall through the recycling equipment and don't get recycled. Instead, put small plastic items in the trash.

A good rule of thumb? If the plastic item is smaller than your fist and is not labeled with a number 1, 2 or 5, it belongs in the trash.

Please mow your lawn <u>AWAY</u> from the street so your grass clippings do not end up in the City's storm sewers. The storm sewers are not designed to handle leaves and grass clippings from residences. This extra material may cause back-ups which could result in flooding. Save the City and yourself problems and money by being responsible and mowing your lawn <u>AWAY</u> from the street. Let's set a good example to show our children that protecting the environment is important.

## **O Xcel** Energy<sup>®</sup> Rolling Out Smart Meters in Lauderdale

Xcel Energy recently mailed postcards to Lauderdale residents about the installation of Smart Meters. The roll out is expected to happen in Lauderdale between July and December 2023. Xcel Energy says these grid enhancements allow:

- For faster recognition and response times to outages
- For homeowners to monitor energy usage in real time
- For secure, two-way transfer of data

The new smart meter technology will create the opportunity for customers to have new pricing options like time-of-use rates or programs designed specifically for appliances or equipment that use significant amounts of electricity, such as space heaters and air conditioning units.
